Joseph Knight's gift from an old friend in Nauvoo

From William G. Hartley's book, *Stand By My Servant Joseph*, comes this story about Joseph Smith's gift of a cane to Joseph Knight, Sr.


Joseph Smith's Esteem for the Knights

"Father Knight, who turned 70 while living in Nauvoo, was a respected citizen there. The Prophet admired him and said so. . . One day Joseph Smith spotted Father Joseph Knight hobbling down a Nauvoo Street. Joseph stepped up to his dear friend, put his arm around him, and pressed the man's gnarled fingers around the top of a cane. "Brother Knight, you need this cane more than I do," he said. Then according to the family tradition, he told Father Knight to

keep the cane as long as he needed it but then to pass it on to a Knight descendant named Joseph and have him do the same. Later on Joseph Knight, Jr. received the cane, and it passed from generation to generation in the family to a Knight descendant named Joseph to the present day."¹

Presented to the Museum

"Joseph Knight, Sr.'s cane was presented to the Church History Library on May 29, 2009. Elder Marlin K. Jensen of the Seventy (former Church Historian and Recorder) received the cane from Jim Knight of Arizona, a spokesman for the Knight family descendants. Nearly 100 Knight descendants were in attendance."²

Joseph Knight, the man holding the cane, was the son of Joseph Knight, Jr., the son of Joseph Knight, Sr. This photo was probably taken about 1951, before he passed away in 1952.
